AN INVITATION TO UW-BARABOO


The Women's Studies Conference has been an annual event in the University of Wisconsin System since 1975. This year the conference takes place at the UW Centers' Baraboo campus and has as its theme Women Changing: Classrooms, Communities, and Culture.

We invite you to the Friday evening, October 9, presentation of **Quilters**, a sevenwoman play using the metaphor of the quilt to explore the lives of pioneer women. And to the daytime programs on both Friday and Saturday. Listed in detail below and on the reverse, they include films and videos, slide-lectures, papers designed to raise difficult questions about women's studies, sessions which explore the workings of poverty and violence in women's lives, and a summary panel/discussion to address new directions for research and action.
