

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



DR. CAROLYN MERCHANT is professor of Environmental history, philosophy, and ethics at the University of California, Berkeley. She is the author of *The Death of Nature: Women, Ecology, and the Scientific Revolution* (1980); *Nature, Gender, and Science in New England* (1989); *Radical Ecology: The Search for a Livable World* (1992); and *Earthcare: Women and the Environment* (1995) as well as numerous articles on the history of science, environmental history, and women and the environment. Merchant is a graduate of Vassar College and received her master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in the history of science and an honorary doctorate from the Umea University in Sweden. She has been a fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences, Stanford; a fellow of the American Council of Learned Societies; a Guggenheim fellow; a Fulbright senior scholar in Sweden; and the 1991 ecofeminist scholar at Murdoch University in Western Australia. She has been involved with numerous environmental history committees and associations.

Senator Gwendolynne Moore, a single mother and former welfare recipient, was elected to the Wisconsin State Senate in 1992 and re-elected in 1996. Moore is one of the most articulate advocates for minorities and the poor and is actively involved with a variety of political committees and organizations. Moore has used her humor, strength, and intelligence amid dramatic personal chaos and family crisis, and has relied on those same talents to help others in need. Overcoming racial and gender-based stereotypes throughout her career has only strengthened Moore's competence, intelligence and foresight in helping to make needed change to state-level government. Moore graduated from North Division High School in Milwaukee and received her B.A. degree in political science from Marquette University. In 1983, Moore earned her certification in Credit Union Management from Milwaukee Area Technical College.

DR. JONI SEAGER is a feminist geographer who has written and lectured extensively on issues of "making feminist sense of environmental issues," and on militarism and the environment. She is the author of two environmental atlases and, most recently, of *The State of Women in the World Atlas and Earth Follies: Coming to Feminist Terms with the Global Environmental Crisis*. She is a professor of geography and women's studies at the University of Vermont. She writes regularly for both popular and academic audiences, lectures across the country on environmental and feminist topics and has served as a commentator on environmental issues for the BBC, CNN, and National Public Radio.
